Oldie but goodie

Alchemists brew Jonson satire

The second major production of the Stanislaus State College Drama Department this year, Ben Jonson's comedy, THE ALCHEMIST, will open in the main stage theatre this month.

THE ALCHEMIST will open Feb. 11 and will play for two weekends, Feb. 11-12 and Feb. 18-19. In addition, two half-price performances are scheduled: a preview on Feb. 19th, and a matinee, Sunday afternoon Feb. 20th. The evening performance

begins at 8:00 p.m.; the matinee at 2:00 p.m. Ticket prices are: \$1.50 general admission; \$1 for non-SSC students; and \$.50 for SSC students. The box office is open now Monday through Friday noon to 5:00 p.m. and on performance nights beginning at 7:00 p.m. Tickets may be purchased in person or reserved by calling 632-0761 during box office hours.

The play is a satirical farce showing the best of Jonson who was Shakespeare's most famous contemporary playwright and the first Poet Laureate of England. It was produced most recently by the Berkeley Repetory Company in the Bay Area. Jonson's riotous humor deals with all sorts of low life characters in varied situations. Rogues, fools, vagabonds and other "anti-establishment types" that lurk at the fringes of society, join together to get something for nothing.

Directed by Professor Douglas McDermott, the boisterous hilarity of Jonson's style abounds as Jerry McDonnell (Subtle), and Steve Mackey (Face), lead the efforts of a small group of petty thieves who are out to strike it rich in one big haul.

According to United Professors of California (AFL/CIO) spokesmen, on Friday, January 28, President Carl Gatlin revealed that he will not, at this time, revise his decision to terminate the contracts of eight Stanislaus State College faculty members. Dr. Gatlin also takes note that "a substantial portion" of the college faculty opposes his decision.

At the largest faculty meeting of this kind ever held at Stanislaus State College, the faculty voted Monday, January 24, to support the retention of the eight professors. They also criticized Dr. Gatlin's reversal of the faculty retention committee recommendation on their behalf.

The resolution passed at the meeting of one hundred and thirty two faculty members concluded: "Therefore be it resolved that the General Faculty of Stanislaus State College strongly objects to this action of the President, and most urgently recommends that the action be rescinded, and that the aforementioned faculty members be retained, and that henceforth the President exercise his discretion and power within the boundaries established by Appendix D, the Faculty Handbook, the Administrative Code, title V, A, A.U.P. guidelines, and Stanislaus State College tradition."

Many professors at the meeting urged that their eight colleagues be retained. According to Union spokesmen, President Gatlin, speaking at the meeting, revealed retention - promotion - tenure data in indicating that he had reversed faculty decisions thirteen times in two years.

At the meeting, Gatlin asked the President of the United Professors of California for the names of the Unions Executive Committee. He refused, stating that as he and four other Union members were being terminated, revealing names of Union members might put them in jeopardy.

Before the vote was taken, a resolution asking for a mail ballot was defeated. Speakers against this resolution stressed that only those who heard the full debate were qualified to vote, and that nearly all the faculty were present.

BE IT MOVED that the General Faculty of Stanislaus State College adopt by secret ballot at this meeting of January 24, 1972, the following resolution:

WHEREAS the President of Stanislaus State College has overturned the recommendations of the campus-wide RPT committee as well as the recommendations of department chairmen, Deans, and departmental RPT committees, terminating the contracts of certain probationary faculty members either outright or conditionally,

WHEREAS the American Association of University Professors' guidelines clearly stipulate that a college administration should

overrule the recommendations of its faculty committees and deans only very rarely and only for "compelling reasons,"

WHEREAS the administration has offered either no reason at all for its actions, or reasons involving a PhD degree for some faculty members and not others, WHEREAS, although the consultative process (Administrative Code Title V, 42701) requires the President to apply the criteria in the Faculty Handbook, Appendix D, section I, the President, in denying retention solely on the ground of the lack of a doctorate or its equivalent (or no reason at all), failed to properly apply the said criteria, thereby abusing the discretion conferred upon him pursuant to Administrative Code Title V, 42702,

WHEREAS such administrative action clearly undermines constitutionally prescribed due process from the faculty committee level to the school dean level and constitutes a threat to the professional judgement, integrity, and credibility of the RPT committees, Deans, Faculty, and our College, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the General Faculty of Stanislaus State College strongly objects to this action of the President, and most urgently recommends that the action be rescinded, and that the aforementioned faculty members be retained, and that henceforth the President exercise his discretion and power within the boundaries established by Appendix D, the Faculty Handbook, The Administrative Code Title V, AAUP guidelines, and Stanislaus State College tradition.

SELECTIVE SERVICE

An ever-changing situation ...

As of November 2, 1972 the Selective Service System released the first in a series of changes which will affect almost all persons registered and future registrants with the Selective Service System. A few classifications have been abolished and new ones created, placing many young men into new or at present unknown classifications.

One of the major changes concerns 2-S student deferments. Undergraduate college students who were not enrolled on a full-time basis and making satisfactory progress toward a baccalaureate degree during the regular 1970-71 academic year will not qualify for 2-S deferments. Also the establishment of a new classification 1-H also is one of

SSC grads fill job needs

The SSC Placement and Career Planning office has completed a summary report of their activities for the past academic year, 1970-71.

Two major categories of placement were reviewed: teaching, and business (or general). 165 teachers actively teaching, and teachers actively sought positions for September 1971. 137 found employment: almost 90% of those actively seeking. The placement record follows:

of Turlock. Over 81% of these individuals are working within a 25 mile radius of the campus.

In Business and general placement, 131 graduating seniors availed themselves of the services provided by the Career Planning and Placement Office. 89 of these students reported that they had found employment: this a percentage of 68.

Several conclusions are evident: teaching positions ARE available to well-prepared, highly recommended candidates. Moreover, the record of teacher placement at SSC is much better than many other teacher-training institutions in California. Finally, the majority of teachers prepared at SSC obtain positions relatively close to Turlock.

The placement record for Business Administration and general academic majors indicates that some 27 recent graduates are involved with accounting, auditing, or bookkeeping. 10 individuals are in positions of management or management training, 10 are performing office or office technician functions; 8 are in sales, and more than 30 are involved with "miscellaneous" employment. Except for those prepared in Business Administration (especially accounting) the opportunities for employment are scarce. The lesson is clear: start looking for employment opportunities early and be flexible in outlook.


Wilderness slide show

Warriors face All-Stars

The U.S. Army All-Star basketball team will play an exhibition game against Stanislaus State College in the Turlock High School gym at 8 p.m. this evening.

The exhibition contest, sponsored by the Stanislaus Warriors Booster Club, marks the second straight year the Army All-Stars have picked up SSC as a warmup to the national Amateur Athletic Union tournament in Kentucky, a warmup to national interservice and Amateur Athletic Union action in late February and early March.

Stanislaus kept pace with the Army team in the first half of last year's game but then were outclassed in the second half and the All-Stars won going away. The army squad later went on to win the interservice competition and the AAU title.

A preliminary game between Turlock's City League All-Stars (George White) Rick Wright, Bob Cole, and others) and a team from Stockton or San Francisco will play at 6 p.m.

Several large and small college players are on the Army roster again, including James E. Oxley, captain of the military academy team at West Point, who played here last year. Another returnee is Michael W. Krzyzewski, a member of last year's national champion squad, a former team captain at West Point, and presently an assistant All-army coach.

These two player plus at least a dozen more with a wide range of honors make the Army All-Stars another national threat in spite of the loss of San Jose State College star Darnell Hillman who went into pro ranks after last season. 

Cagers' recap

Jan. 14—The Warriors journeyed to San Francisco State and suffered their first loss at the hands of Far West Conference opposition, dropping a 84-66 decision to the league-leading Gators. SSC gave the home squad all it could handle for the first twenty-eight minutes of play before a Warrior cold spell put the Gators out of reach.

Trailing 54-52, Stanislaus failed to score for four and one-half minutes while S.F. State tallied sixteen points. Arthur Shank led all scorers with 19 points, but was the only SSC player in double figures. Center Jack Wilson paced the balanced Gator attack with 17 markers as all five starters reached double figures.

Jan. 15—SSC got back on the win trail with an impressive 100-85 victory over the visiting Pioneers of Cal State Hayward. After a lackluster performance in the first half, the Warriors exploded for sixty points in the second period to overcome a 41-40 half-time deficit and reach the century mark for the second time this season.

Warrior playmaker Ron Thomson turned in an outstanding game and led the scoring with 21 points. Arthur Shanks contributed 19, and Lawrence Small and Andy Glover each came off the bench to collect 15. Pioneer center, Pat Loushin captured games honors with 22 points.

Jan. 17—Playing their third game in four nights, the Warriors survived a second-half scare and turned back the Fresno Pacific College Vikings by a score of 71-68. Reversing its usual form, the SSC five played in the first half but then stumbled in the second period.

The Warriors won the contest with some exceptional free throw shooting, converting 17 of 21 attempts while being outscored from the field by two field goals. Making his first start of the year, Andy Glover responded with a 20-point performance to lead all scorers. Arthurs Shanks followed with 19 and Ron Thomson added 11. Ken Thiesen paced the visitors with 17 points.

Jan. 22—SSC made it three in a row last Saturday night with an easy 82-71 victory over the Toros of Cal State Dominguez Hills. The Warriors had previously beaten the visitors 88-81 in overtime on the road.

The Stanislaus squad ran up a 48-35 lead in the first period, but were unable to match that scoring in the second half. Arthur Shanks and Ron Thomson paced the Warrior effort with 19 and 18 points respectively. Toro center Ruben Navorro led his team with 18 points.

Baseball prospects bright

The 1972 baseball season is on hand, the first game is scheduled for February 15th on the home diamond. Despite difficulties due to decision of players not to play, ineligibility due to grades, an one victim of army induction, Coach Jim Bowen describes his expectations as "very hopeful and optimistic". He stated, "Our players work extremely hard. Signs of pride, integrity, and enthusiasm are emerging." Altogether, approximately seven letterman are returning this year. This give the team an advantage since these players are familiar with challenging teams to a certain degree. Perhaps the Warriors

greatest asset is the pitching staff with five very capable athletes. Among these pitchers is John Handley who was with the team in '71. All but one of the starting infielders are new. Thus Bowen described the infield as being "Capable of doing their job, but as of yet, they're untested." He then continued, "This is where the eight scrimmage games will be of help." Jim Heckendorf, last year's Most Valuable Player, will once again play outfield. Jim is bound to be the strong hand in this, his third year of collegiate baseball. Also in the outfield, are returning Lettermen, Bill Cantrell, (Billy Bob), and Mark DeLa-

Motte. New to the team this year are Dave Butler (pitching), Frank Moscato (pitching), Greg Stephens (pitching), Jerry Jilka (pitching), Roy Bristow (third base), Art Flores (first base), and Varsity basketball player Steve French. French is expected to be active in the outfield. Returning letterman, Marco Sigala will alternate with Ron Jessee as Catcher. Marco also plays right field. Thus far, four scrimmage games have been played. The record stands at 2-1-1. These games were played against Merced Junior College. Other scrimmage games will be with Modesto Junior College, Merced again and finally Chabot. Twenty games are scheduled for the winter program with a total of 49 games. Thirty of those will be played on the home diamond.

With more than two hours practice daily, the team will be prepared to meet their challengers prepared to meet their challengers. Participation in baseball outside of the college will also result in better team preparation.

John Handley and Jim Heckendorf were chosen co-team captains for this year. Coach Bowen and Assistant Coaches Larry Johnson (SSC Graduate 1971), and Jim Cantrell have confidence in the co-captains and in the team. Last year, the Warriors finished with a seasonal record of twelve wins and eighteen losses. That is definitely a record to be surpassed.
